Saint Jude, Spring and Hope

"No matter how long the winter, spring is sure to follow" - old English proverb

SAINTE JUDE IS THE Patron Saint of Hope, and in this year we can be pilgrims of hope perhaps guiding people to find out about him.

I have had the privilege of working with the Carmelites at the Shrine and throughout the Province for over ten years now. One of the highlights of that time is being able to speak to friends of Saint Jude - many of whom tell me about the hope they experience through the Apostle - knowing that, like him, none of

us are forgotten by God.

Now we are once more enjoying the beginnings of spring - a season that provides hope for the future.

It brings forth new life and important hope of sunnier and more colourful landscapes. It is the season of new starts and ideas bursting from the ground like the return of daffodils and bluebells. God is ever present in this season of hope.

In February, many of us will remember 'Holocaust

Memorial Day' which gives us a chance to recall the past, learn more about it and empathise with others today. We can then take action for a better future. One of the victims of this terrible time was Anne Frank - in her diary, she wrote that those who could should: *"...go outside, to the country, enjoy the sun and all nature has to offer. Go outside and try to recapture the happiness within yourself; think of all the beauty in yourself and in everything around you - be happy..."*.

How right she was. As we consider hope and spring, let us ponder the first part of one of my favourite poems by William Wordsworth: '**I wandered lonely as a cloud**'.

*I wandered lonely as a cloud
That floats on high o'er vales and hills,
When all at once I saw a crowd,
A host, of golden daffodils;
Beside the lake, beneath the trees,
Fluttering and dancing in the breeze.*

*Continuous as the stars that shine
And twinkle on the milky way,
They stretched in never-ending line
Along the margin of a bay:
Ten thousand saw I at a glance,
Tossing their heads in sprightly dance.*

- William Wordsworth (1770 – 1850)

The poem encompasses the thoughts of the poet after he has wandered over the hills with their never-ending row of enchanting spring flowers. They impressed him so much that he compares the flowers with the sparkling stars of the galaxy. He is captivated by the startling view of nature. This everlasting impact, triggered by nature, often serves as a delight for the poet, when he feels low or lonely at home.

The infinitesimal nature and expanse of the spring flowers and the galaxy of stars remind us of the greatness of God - and thus, the hope he provides. A hope that we can share with others.

Here are three suggestions for spring.

First, go outside - especially if you are working from home or at home, stuck in an office/school all day - go out and enjoy God's creation. Breathe in nature. Remind yourself about what has changed since

winter and go find those golden daffodils!

Secondly - please come and see us. The Shrine is open every day and the offices are open Monday to Friday from 9am - 5pm each day. We would love to meet you and share these beautiful gardens with more friends of Saint Jude - come any time or come and visit us on 30 May 2026. The Garden of Hope and Whitefriars contemplative gardens will soon be "fluttering and dancing in the breeze" - all are welcome.

And, finally, as Pilgrims of Hope, tell your friends about Saint Jude and his Shrine. The more people that know about Saint Jude, the more hope we can spread.

INTERNATIONAL Women's Day will fall on 8 March. Celebrate Carmelite women by visiting us and viewing some of the beautiful art here, or simply visit our website. Here's just one remarkable Carmelite woman.

Saint Thérèse of Lisieux

"I understood that all we accomplish, however brilliant, is worth nothing without love." - Saint Thérèse

Saint Thérèse (1873 – 1897) was a French Discalced Carmelite nun widely venerated in

modern times.

Whilst still young she entered Carmel of Lisieux, where she lived in the greatest humility and evangelical simplicity and confidence in God. By word and example she taught the novices these same virtues.

She is popularly known as "The Little Flower of Jesus" and has been a highly influential model of sanctity because of the "simplicity and practicality of her approach to the spiritual life". Offering her life for the salvation of souls and the spread of

the Church, she died on 30 September 1897.

Together with Saint Francis of Assisi, she is one of the most popular saints in the history of the church. She is also a Doctor of the Church.

The statue pictured above is from the small shrine to Thérèse and Our Lady of Mount Carmel situated here.
