THE SHRINE OF ST. JUDE.

THE first news we give you of the . Shrine of St. Jude is sad. Mr. Anthony Foster, the sculptor, died on March 15th at the age of forty-seven.

"The sudden death of Anthony Foster, sculptor and letter-carver, is a loss for the English Catholic community as well as for his young family and the friends who loved and admired him. A pupil of Eric Gill, to whose ideals he always remained devoted, Anthony Foster had come to be recognised as one of the best Christian artists of his time in England. His work has an unsensational beauty reflecting the gentle and deeply religious nature of its source. The spiritual quality, expressed with the skill of a trained craftsman, deserves to outlive many more sensational products of our time. To his fellow-Catholics at least, this artist who always shunned publicity, working in poverty and hampered by continual illhealth, has left a small treasure of fine carving of which they can be proud and for which they should be grateful."

Anthony Foster carved for the Shrine of St. Jude the panels of the twelve Apostles in Portland stone and also the baptismal font. We are very proud to have in the Shrine of St. Jude such beautiful examples of his work.

Perhaps our most treasured possession is the little plaque of the Madonna which has been erected in the hallway of Delbridge House Club. It is one of the sweetest and tenderest tributes in stone to Our Blessed Lady that I have ever seen. Not all our Club members are art minded, but it is remarkable to see its influence upon them. They stand and look at it, and evidently regard it with a certain awe.

It is remarkable how faith can sustain. not merely an artist, but a mother of children. I had a letter from his wife to say that she is proud to be the mother of his six children, that he was a perfect father and that she is not in any way discouraged at the size of her problem.

You remember the long list of things we gave in our last issue that we required for the Shrine of St. Jude. Our generous clients have made this list considerably smaller. Now nothing is left except the Street Sign, the Mosaic behind the altar. the Reliquary and only one window— Our Lady of Mount Carmel as She appeared in Fatima.

Any further donations that come in towards the Shrine will be used to pay off the cost of the Reliquary.

There is something interesting about the Reliquary. It came from a famous collection, it is in Flemish silver dated 1547. How it came to England and became part of a famous collection is hidden from us. Anyway, there was great danger of its being purchased by America and it was suggested to me that I should buy it for the Shrine of St. Jude. The price was £780. That seemed far too much, even for me; so I said, "God is good, but one must not push Him too far." I said I would buy it for £500. To my astonishment they said, "yes"—but it took them a little time to do so. So, we have the Reliquary. I haven't got the figures at my hand but I think that some £200 has been subscribed towards it already. We are very proud to have such a remarkable example of Flemish silver craftmanship in our Shrine.

We had to get a display case made for it out of hard wood and plate glass. A good lady since we wrote to you last,

donated the full sum. We would like to thank her and all the others who gave us their support.

Now, we come to the Mosaic.

Behind the statue there is curved a half circle and the intention was to cover it with mosaic. It happens that the man who designed the Shrine is a mosaic artist. It is very expensive work, but we gave him the job. I gave a ceiling of £500 total cost—if we don't pay for it this year, then we will pay for it next year, but it will be worth while to have something really colourful and rich for the background of the statue.

For the rest, the new stained glass windows by Richard King are now completed and have been erected. They make the place shine like a jewel. He, too, is a wonderful artist and we are very proud to have examples of his work in our Shrine.

We are receiving many enquiries from Catholic Societies all over England who wish to visit the Shrine. They are principally coach pilgrimages, but we like them that size because we have not enough room to manoeuvre large parties of the faithful.

Cardinal Piazza to preside at

Carmelite Congress

preside at the First International Congress of the Carmelite Third Order, August 13—15 in Fatima. The Congress will coincide with the formal opening of the new Carmelite International Centre which will be dedicated to Our Lady of Mt. Carmel and Blessed Nuno Alvares Pereira. The Centre was built at the

suggestion of Sister Lucy to commemorate the apparition of Our Lady in the Habit of Carmel. The B. Nuno is the national hero of Portuguese independence. After the famous battles of Aljubarrota and Valverde that freed his country from Castilian domination, he became an humble Lay Brother in the Carmel of Lisbon where he died in 1342. One of his descendants was Catherine of Aragon, wife of Henry VIII of England. Over a thousand delegates from the various provinces of the Order are expected. The theme of the Conferences is the Spiritual Life and the Apostolate of the Third Order of Carmel. An all-night Vigil for the peace of the world will be kept in preparation for the feast of the Assumption. His Eminence will sing Pontifical Mass at 11 o'clock on the Feast and the Congress will close that same afternoon with a Discourse by him and Solemn Pontifical Benediction.

CATTLE BREEDING.

TRELAND is a great cattle breeding country. Cattle grow fat upon the rich land of the midlands. SUPPLEMENT

THE SHRINE OF ST. JUDE.

WE are getting quite a number of pilgrims to the Shrine of St. Jude. It looks very fine now. All the stained glass windows are up and they look magnificent—rich reds and blues and a design that is a compromise between the conventional and the modern. All the windows have been donated.

The street sign has been donated as well. I thought that that would be a hard nut to crack, but it wasn't. It is a very fine piece of metal work from the "Fleur-de-Lis" Hotel in Canterbury. I bought the hangers too, but I cannot get them until they pull the hotel down, which may be never. Do you know it is almost impossible to buy a telegraph pole? But I got one in the end.

Sister Barbara, of the Institute of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, in Allington Castle, has made three ceramics for the altar. They show the Crucifixion with two adoring angels. They cost £15 each and remain to be donated. She will do two other ceramics one showing St. Jude preaching, and the other his martyrdom. They will flank the entrance to the Chapel; much larger—they will cost about £45 each. Sister Barbara works more for the love of God than for money, but such people take twice as long to do a thing as others. Yet, it is worth the patience involved.

The Mosaic behind the St. Jude statue is going up at the moment. I never

thought that mosaic involved such complicated and meticulous piecing together. I gave the artist a ceiling of £500 to do the job, of which £220 has already been subscribed. We are hoping that it will be finished by the end of August.

I didn't tell you about the Monstrance that holds the relic of St. Jude. It is called the Oscot Monstrance. It is the work of a Flemish silversmith dated 1547 and is an exceedingly beautiful piece of Flemish silver work. It came from a collection that was being sold, but there was some desire that the Monstrance should remain in England and be used in a Catholic church. I enquired the cost of it and found that the Committee in charge of the sale expected £780—that is a lot of money. I didn't have £780, but I hedged and said, "No, it is quite impossible. I can't offer more than £500." To my surprise and consternation they gave it to me, to save it going to America.

So there you are; I had a Monstrance that was a magnificent piece of silver and I paid for it gradually. I didn't spare myself in criticism, but I mentioned it in the "Carmelite News" and various members subscribed £227 towards it. Last week a woman gave me a valuable bracelet which was a bequest from a friend of St. Jude. Imagine my amazement when I found that the bracelet itself was worth over £500. The other things for the Shrine will come too, if we have patience. The Mosaic is the trouble now.

No man's memory persists on the earth, it seems that his bones are safe only when

I remember the story of Cyrus, the greatest of all the Persian Emperors, and one of the most enlightened rulers in the history of mankind. A man so remarkable that it would be a blessing if the world could see his like again. He conquered Jerusalem, and left the Jews in the enjoyment of their liberties and of their religion. He conquered the Eastern world, but he conquered, to liberate it from the savagery of its oppressors. He died 530 years before Christ and was buried near Persepolis. Here was a magnificent garden enclosed by a high wall. His tomb was unpretentious, a small stone building with six steps leading up to it, and over the entrance there was an inscription: - - - -"O man, whoever you are and whenever you come, for I know that you will come, know that I am Cyrus, who gave the Persians their empire. Do not grudge me this patch of earth that covers my body."

To-day, his golden sarcophagus has gone, the inscription has gone—the stone building remains, a desert ruin; and the lion is still lord of the chase where once the armies of Persia halted to bury their lord. Had he been buried below ground, the sands of the desert would have gathered over him until the day of resurrection. Don't poke your head over the ground when you are dead.

You can't take it with you! There are many good people in the world who make good use of their money and who do pay tribute to God. Many give no thought to it at all; they try to take it with them. Empty we came, and empty we shall go, but we do have some assurance that the wind won't blow the dust of our bones into the eyes of the passing traveller. It rains too much in these countries.

Everyday one reads of them in the City of London—banquets graced by royalty, by the kings of industry and finance, and you hear them thank, even on television, "the God from whom all blessings flow" Yet, how few of those whom God has blessed so abundantly, remember the Giver of all gifts—maybe they suffer from the "bug" introduced into the world by American "know how"—the belief that men can do it all themselves—with stomach ulcers. They give nothing back, and go to God with empty hands.
